

CCS

- 28 member libraries in the Northern and Northwestern suburbs of Chicago, IL.
- On May 19th, the Cataloging and Metadata Management (or CAMM) Technical Group passed a motion to allow Homosaurus terms to be added to the catalog.
- Land Acknowledgement: This area is located on the ancestral lands of indigenous tribes, such as the Council of the Three Fires--comprised of the Ojibwe, Odawa, and Potawatomi Nations--as well as the Miami, Ho-Chunk, Menominee, Sac, Fox, Kickapoo, and Illinois Nations.


What is Homosaurus?

- Homosaurus is an international linked data vocabulary of Lesbian, Gay, Bisexual, Transgender, and Queer (LGBTQ+) terms.
- This vocabulary is intended to supplement other controlled vocabularies.
- It's maintained by the <u>Digital Transgender Archive</u>.
- It has been assigned the source code homoit (\$2) for use in OCLC records.
- Example:

650 _7 ‡a Non-binary people. ‡2 homoit

Why are libraries using Homosaurus?

- Gender and Sexuality terms have evolved over the last 20 years.
- LCSH subject headings for LGBTQ+ topics do not properly represent all of the current terms being used.
- Adding inclusive subject headings creates a more supportive environment and educates the public on the proper terms to use.
- Adding additional terms allows more items to be discoverable that were previously difficult to find.




Example: Aromantic people


- LCSH includes the subject headings for asexuality, but not for aromantic people.
- Loveless can be discovered as a book that includes the topic of asexuality. However, it also includes the topic of aromanticism.
- Common Bonds does not have an accurate LCSH term available, because it is only an aromantic anthology.
- Homosaurus term:
 - Aromantic people
 - Possible additions in the future: Asexual fiction and Aromantic fiction




Example: Pansexual people



- Some books with pansexual characters are completely hidden or only have the term in a summary.
- There is no equivalent LCSH term.
- The only indicator that In The Ravenous Dark by A.M. Strickland includes pansexual characters and polyamorous relationships is on the Goodreads.com page.
- Homosaurus terms:
 - Pansexual people
 - Polyamory
 - Fantasy fiction (LGBTQ)
 - Romance fiction (LGBTQ)





Example: Non-Binary People

- Although transgender subject headings exist, the current LCSH terms for non-binary people are not the currently preferred term:
 - Gender-nonconformity
 - Gender-nonconforming people
- Gender-nonconformity depicts a bias that believes in the adherence to gender stereotypes of a binary gender system.
- Non-Binary is the term most used by CCS library patrons.
- Homosaurus terms:
 - Non-binary people
 - Assigned female
 - Assigned male

Additional Homosaurus terms to highlight

- Birth certificate amendments
- Corrective rape
- Genderqueer people
- Genderfluid
- Latinx
- Common slang
- Foreign terms that may be used by immigrants:
 - Hijra

More detailed genre terms:

- Bisexual horror fiction
- Bisexual fantasy fiction
- Transgender horror fiction
- Potential future terms:
 - Asexual fiction
 - Aromantic fiction

The Executive Committee Opinion

- Executive Committee is a subset of the Governing Board.
- Adding new terms or correcting existing terms increases access points.
- It is appropriate for CCS to work with library staff to move forward with allowing terms from additional thesauri without approval.
- EC approval is only necessary when LCSH terms are replaced.

SCRAP Advisory Group's Original Opinion

- SCRAP (Standard Cataloging Rules and Practices Advisory Group) members voiced their concern over vocabulary that contradicts LCSH or common meanings, as well as sexually explicit terms.
- SCRAP recommended reviewing Homosaurus to select the most appropriate terms for CCS.
- After SCRAP makes a policy recommendation, a technical group needs to approve it.
- Homosaurus terms that are contradictory:
 - Bears LCSH term for an animal
 - Cubs not LCSH but animal related
 - Faeries not LCSH, but mythical creature
 - Goldilocks not LCSH but fictional character
 - Metis Metís is a tribe's name
 - Pups not LCSH but animal related
 - Slaves (as a BDSM role) LCSH, should be used for actual slavery
 - Sodomites not LCSH, but biblical
 - Ali a common name

CCS Staff Members' Opinion

- CCS staff discussed the SCRAP opinion to make a recommendation to the technical group.
- •CCS's preference was to vote on a motion to allow all terms from Homosaurus in the CCS database.
- CCS is interested in adding the vocabulary to be more inclusive and doesn't want to limit terms.
- Objectionable Homosaurus terms are more relevant to archives and special libraries than public libraries.
- The workload required to review and select terms, and maintain the list is not the best use of SCRAP's time.
- We analyzed a list of commonly used search terms and compared them to Homosaurus to identify problematic terms.
- A catalog handbook page includes guidance on how to best use your Cataloger's judgement when applying terms.

CAMM Technical Group Approved the Motion

- After SCRAP approves a recommendation, Cataloging and Metadata
 Management Technical Group (CAMM) votes to approve the policy change.
- My presentation included an explanation of how the cataloging handbook could include guidance on applying Homosaurus terms.
- The motion passed to allow all Homosaurus terms within the guidelines of the catalog manual (Catalog Wiki).
- CCS also announced the plan to provide Homosaurus training with a member of the editorial board.

CCS Local Practices

- Homosaurus Subject Headings Draft Page:
 http://www.ccslib.org/Catalogers/index.php/Homosaurus Subject Headings
- Homosaurus does not label genre headings, but CCS places subject headings in 650 and genre headings in 655. The 2nd indicator should be 7. The source could should be included in \$2.
 - Examples:

```

- In discussion: literary form subdivisions that match LCSH subdivision.
- Terms with contradictory meanings should be avoided. A list of terms is included on the page.
- New authority records are added when a new term is added. Procedures for requesting the creation of an authority record are documented on the page.

Homosaurus Usage in the CCS Catalog

Within two months of approval:

- 29 authority records were created for Homosaurus terms
- Homosaurus terms were added to 222 bibliographic records.
