- Introductions
- Helice described the upcoming DLDG virtual meeting on February 15, 2013 at 2:00 PM (EST) / 11:00 AM (PST). Author and New School professor, Elizabeth Kendall, will be the special guest. She will discuss her forthcoming book, *Balanchine and the Lost Muse*, with the group. Elizabeth describes the book, which will be published officially on July 1, 2013, as "a parallel investigation of the early lives of two key figures in Russian ballet, in the crucial time surrounding the Russian revolution: the young George Balanchine, (Georgi Balanchivadze), and, his friend, classmate and early collaborator, the brilliant young Petrograd ballerina Lidiia Ivanova, who drowned in 1924 (possibly murdered)." Helice will send out a meeting reminder with a link and instructions on how to join the online meeting approximately a week before the event.
- There was a brief, but lively exchange on a discussion topic which had been sent in regarding
 how dance librarians are dealing with faculty requests to make materials available online or
 through a course management site. It was generally agreed that there is a continued need for
 effective advocacy on issues relating to fair use.
- Tim Lloyd of Alexander Street Press was on hand to discuss a pilot project to host rights-cleared performing arts audio and video created by libraries or faculty on the APS platform. There would be no cost or commitment involved other than providing sample digital content and metadata to be hosted on a test site. Tufts University has signed on as a participant and Tim is looking for other institutions or organizations that also may be interested.
- Helice also announced the imminent release of *Bebe Miller: Cantos Gordos*, the latest in the
 Repertory performance DVD library and archive series (volume 7), produced by Hannah Wiley,
 director of the University of Washington Dance Program's Chamber Dance Company.
 Unfortunately, there was not sufficient time (or resources) to show clips from the DVD.
- Seattle dance critic, Sandra Kurtz, gave an informal, but heartfelt presentation on her own aspirations for, and interest in, assisting libraries in documenting their own communities' local dance scenes.
