What is a personal librarian (PL) program?

- Outreach program that connects librarians with a group of students (often initially through email) to offer advice and tips related to library services, resources, and research support
- Students can contact librarian at anytime for help, and request to meet in-person

Benefits of PL Programs

Benefits for Librarians

- Provide tips at specific times during the year (i.e.: exam bank and study spaces during exam break)
- Learn more about what students are asking
- Engage with new students who may not know much about the library


Benefits for Students

- Feel comfortable asking for advice
- Have a direct, personal contact at the library
- Learn about library supports they may not otherwise be aware of




Common Benefits from Partnerships

Building Commitments to Partnerships

- External Pressures
 - Staff time
 - Accountability
- Values
 - Assess the need re-emphasizing our role in student learning
 - Identify campus partners
- Learning
 - Informing potential partners about program advantages
- Networks
 - Allow potential partners to use library for meetings and events
 - Library staff serve on campus committees

Commitment to Partnerships

- Mission
 - Does the program support the mission of the University and department
 - Getting partners onboard
- Sense of Priority
 - Support of senior administrators
 - Collaboration written into library documents – strategic plan, annual report
- Networks
 - Key supporters of the PL Program

- Integrating Structures
 - Emails and Newsletters
 - Communication with Partners
 - Maintaining the Partnership
- Rewards
 - Visibility for the program
 - Distinct honor for the university ACRL Excellence in Academic Libraries Award
 - Personal Librarian and First Year Experience Library Conference
- Networks
 - External conversations
 - Relationship in one collaboration leads to others


