

Report on *Information Technology and Libraries* prepared for the Core Board by Ken Varnum, Editor January 2022

Key Activities

This report reflects activities around *Information Technology and Libraries* during the calendar year 2021. The Editorial Board spent a significant amount of time this past calendar year reflecting on the journal's and the Board's role in fostering a more diverse and inclusive environment for our authors and our readers. We approached all planning and strategic activities with this lens in mind.

In thinking about expanding the reviewer pool, creating a diverse pool of reviewers (by institution, geography, and role in the home institution) was essential. As we explored revisions to our journal's scope and mission statements, we kept a diverse audience of readers and authors in mind. And as we progressed through the selection process for the Assistant Editor, we kept in mind that the person filling this role would play a key role in communicating with potential authors, selecting content for publication, and working with authors through the editorial process.

Publishing

The core activity of the Editor and the Editorial Board is soliciting, reviewing and publishing articles. During the past calendar year, ITAL received 134 articles, of which 38 have been accepted after review and 13 have so far been published (see <u>Appendix 1, Table A</u> for a summary since 2016). That results in a 22% acceptance rate over the past calendar year, and 27% for the past six calendar years. Time to publication has remained in the 6-9 month range,

similar to the historical norm, thanks in no small part to our increased reviewer pool (see below), which has allowed us to review more articles without over-burdening individual reviewers.

Peer-Reviewed Content Readership

Full-text PDF downloads in 2021 totaled 136,756, according to the COUNTER reports provided through the publishing platform, a 10% increase over last year (see <u>Appendix 1, Table B</u>). As noted in previous years' reports, a change in COUNTER's counting process likely contributed significantly to the increased numbers in 2019 and beyond.

See <u>Appendix 2</u> for a summary of the most frequently downloaded articles published in 2021 and the most-frequently downloaded articles across all volumes and issues.

Editorial Content Readership

In addition to peer-reviewed content ("articles" and "communications"), each issue of ITAL includes the following regular columns:

- Letter from the Editor
- Editorial Board Thoughts (a contribution from a member of the editorial board, on a topic of their choosing)
- Core Leadership Message (contributed by the someone in division leadership)
- Public Libraries Leading the Way (topics proposed by library technologists working in public libraries, selected by the Editor)

Readership for each of these columns over the year is shown in Table 1.

Improving our Editorial Processes

ITAL Assistant Editor

The Core Board approved the creation of a new Assistant Editor position for ITAL in September 2021. This position had been requested before Core's creation, but a decision was deferred until Core's budget and organizational structures had been established. During fall 2021, the ITAL Board solicited nominations and established a search committee to review and select the first Assistant Editor. Chaired by Ken Varnum, ITAL's editor, the committee's membership was:

- Jon Goddard (ITAL Editorial Board)
- Brady Lund (ITAL Editorial Board)
- Elizabeth Nelson (editor, Library Leadership & Management)
- Mary Beth Weber (editor, *Library Resources & Technical Services*)

We received a strong candidate pool and appointed Marisha Kelly to the role beginning in January 2022.

Adding More ITAL Reviewers

Following up on the proposal in 2020 to add to the breadth and depth of our reviewer pool, ITAL solicited for reviewers in May 2021. During summer 2021, we trained about 30 new reviewers (via Zoom sessions) both in using ITAL's Open Journal Systems interface and in following the journal's content guidelines.

This expanded pool of reviewers has enabled us to handle the increased number of reviewable submissions while maintaining our 6-week target for completing a review round. After an application process, the Editor conducted several group training sessions, both on using Open Journal Systems and how to evaluate articles for the journal. The larger reviewer pool requires a little more time to manage, in terms of selecting the appropriate reviewers for a given submission, but overall has made the operation of the journal more efficient.

Topic Review

Members of the ITAL Editorial Board (Paul Swanson, Soo-yeon Hwang, and Lori Ayre) contributed significant time to a review of topics published by ITAL over the past five years, resulting in a descriptive list of keywords representing topics we have published on. This list maps fairly closely to ITAL's stated scope, which did not provide the direction we had hoped.

Following discussions within the Board, we determined that a more prudent next step would be to consider the journal's scope, refine it if necessary, and implement keyword descriptors for published articles that mapped more closely to the desired scope of the journal. This will enable

us to better measure how well we are doing at publishing on our intended topics. We also decided that we did not have capacity to pursue this work but would defer until after the appointment of the journal's Assistant Editor. Now that we have taken that step, we will come back to our scope statement and more integrated assessment plans in the coming year.

Updated Policies and Procedures

In June 2021, the Editorial Board approved a policy on changing the names of authors of published works. This policy is in recognition that authors may change their names for many reasons, including—but not limited to—gender identity, marriage, divorce, or religious conversion. The new policy is detailed on the ITAL site on the <u>Name Change Policy</u> page. Individuals who wish to make such a change are directed to contact the journal's editor.

Making the ITAL/JOLA Backfile Available

While ITAL has been published online as an open-access publication since 2012, not all of the previous 43 years of ITAL or its predecessor journal, the *Journal of Library Automation* (JOLA), are available online. Over the years, there have been some efforts toward scanning articles available before the journal went online and making those articles available through the ITAL site, but they have not been systematically pursued.

In summer 2021, an ITAL reader (Sandy Roe) approached ITAL's editor with an offer of sharing a significant portion of the missing issues in print form. The University of Michigan Library's digital preservation department offered to scan and process the digitized files as their time allows. Once complete, these digitized copies will be published on the ITAL site. I am most grateful to Larry Wentzel and his staff for taking on this effort.

Editorial Board Membership

The Editor relies heavily on the volunteer efforts of the members of the ITAL Editorial Board. Without their dedicated service and deep knowledge of their respective subject domains, the journal would not exist. Board members during calendar year 2021 are listed in Table 2.

Normally, there would have been more turnover in Board members. However, the Editorial Board made a choice not to seek new Board members in spring 2021 because the merger of LITA with ALCTS and LLAMA to form Core was still pending and there was, at the time, uncertainty about the journal's future; and 2) All members whose terms were ending in June 2021 were eligible for a second term, and all wished to continue for a second term.

Because roughly half the members of the Editorial Board will conclude their second terms in June 2021, we will share a call for volunteers in late winter and make appointments of new members prior to the start of the fiscal year.

Appendix 1: Journal Statistics

Table A shows summary data about article submissions and acceptances for 2016-2021. These figures are derived from the COUNTER stats made available through the Open Journal Systems platform that hosts the site. Because of the variable time the review and revision process can take, not all articles submitted in a given calendar year are accepted or published in that year.

Table B shows monthly downloads of articles from the ITAL site for 2016-2021. Note that starting with May 2019, an updated COUNTER protocol was applied. The salient difference is that, starting in that month, the definition of a "download" changed from including only PDFs to including both PDFs and the abstract page from which the PDF is linked.
